Hymn 637 Wrecked outright on Jesus' breast

- 1 "Wrecked outright on Jesus' breast": Only "wrecked" souls thus can sing; Little boats that hug the shore, Fearing what the storm may bring, Never find on Jesus' breast, All that "wrecked" souls mean by rest.
- 2 "Wrecked outright!" So we lament; But when storms have done their worst, Then the soul, surviving all, In Eternal arms is nursed; There to find that nought can move One, embosomed in such love.
- 3 "Wrecked outright!" No more to own E'en a craft to sail the sea; Still a voyager, yet now Anchored to Infinity; Nothing left to do but fling Care aside, and simply cling.
- 4 "Wrecked outright!" 'Twas purest gain, Henceforth other craft can see That the storm may be a boon, That, however rough the sea, God Himself doth watchful stand, For the "wreck" is in His hand.

Brief Background of the Hymn

In 1909, M. E. Barber returned to China. This time there was no big mission to support her. She had only the Lord of Psalm 23 as her supply. While the ship crossed the Min River in China, she quietly looked to the Lord in dependence for her needs and her future. About an hour's boat ride from Fuchow, farther down the river, was a little village known as Baiyatan. M. E. Barber chose to make her new home there. The daily beautiful list of these little boats along the Min River would likely have given her the inspiration to write about this beautiful life of faith which she possessed.

Under God's sovereign arrangement, the people and things happened in our environment may touch us deeply to make our outer man be "wrecked outright". In such a situation, are we going to "lament" or "sing"? Because of the wonderful faith in the Lord and intimate fellowship with the Lord, M. E. Barber's "wrecked soul" can sing and she regarded "Wrecked outright was purest gain." 2 Cor. 4:16 says "Therefore we do not lose heart; but though our outer man is decaying, yet our inner man is being renewed day by day."

Before we being "wrecked outright", we own a "craft to sail the sea"-- our natural ability and our own ways to handle the needs in our life. We do not trust the Lord so much. After we being "wrecked outright", we become "Anchored to Infinity; Nothing left to do but fling." Thus "we should not base our confidence on ourselves but on God, who raises the dead;(2 Cor. 1:9) May we all follow sister M. E. Barber's footstep, being willing to be "wrecked outright", so that we no longer own any "craft to sail the sea", but fully rest in the Lord to be carried forward by the flow of life for the magnificent House of God.
